1. January	Academic Writing & Referencing	By this time in your EPQ you will have developed a significant number of sources. Some of them will be key to your project, and some you may not use. You now need to start writing your project in an academic manner, using academic language. You will also need to use Harvard Referencing, which is delivered here.		
2. January	1:1s	In this session you will have some formal time 1:1 with your project supervisor to gain feedback and be able to reflect on your Planning Reviews.		
3. February	Candidate Research	This session will be your own time, but supervisors will be on hand to offer advice and support for your projects. The dialog is ongoing.

4. March	Completing	One of the most challenging things of any academic project is handing it in. You never have an infinite amount of time, but it must be structured in an appropriate way, and you must write a good conclusion. We also look at how you evaluate your project, and address the strengths and weaknesses.		
5. March	Presentation Skills	In preparation for your presentation we will look at what a good EPQ presentation looks like. We encourage you to produce something very individual, but meet the objectives that we specify.		
6. March	Presentation Session	The final session is both a celebration of your work, and the opportunity for you to share your project with others. There will be questions which will look at both the content, and the project management of your EPQ.
