Some higher education study options

- Certificate of Higher Education (CertHE) / Diploma of Higher Education (DipHE): first and second year of a degree course.
- Higher National Certificate (HNC) / Higher National Diploma (HND): HNC is a one-year industry specific course, and the HND is a two-year industry specific course.
- **Higher apprenticeships**: provide an opportunity to gain Level 4 qualifications or above, e.g. HND, or foundation degree while you work. Can take from one to five years to complete, depending on the course level.
- Foundation degree: flexible vocational qualification, combining both academic study and workplace learning. It usually takes two years to complete.
- Bachelor's or undergraduate degree (BSc Hons or BA Hons): a three to four-year course which can also be available as a
 part-time option, allowing you to study and work. Students can also apply at some universities for some courses with
 an integrated masters degree resulting in an MSc or MA award.
- Degree apprenticeships: enable you to gain a full undergraduate or master's degree while you work (Level 6 or 7).
 Degree apprenticeships take three to six years to complete, depending on the course level.

A degree apprenticeship

is the equivalent of a traditional university degree and the degree is awarded by a university.

You apply directly to employer offering the apprenticeship. The employer pays the university tuition fees, pays the apprentice's salary and also allows them paid time to study for their degree.

University choices, UCAS applications



Choosing the right place

- Style from traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities/colleges, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- Location some are in large cities, others in small towns, by the coast or in the countryside it's all a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.
- Size larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- Culture and facilities influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics; it can be useful to find out what jobs or further study students go on to.
- Tuition fees can vary between universities and colleges; check if there are scholarships or bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.

Choosing the right course

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different.
- Look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to your career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.
- How is the course taught structured teaching, or more independent research? How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed?

Key facts

- To start an application you need a UCAS Hub account.
 You can register for a UCAS Hub account at any time.
- From May 2025 you'll be able to start your2025/6 application in your UCAS Hub.
- You have up to five university choices, unless applying to study medicine, veterinary, dentistry – then it's four choices for these courses.
- You **can't apply to both** Oxford and Cambridge.
- Applying costs £28.50 (2025/6 entry), unless you qualify for free school meals.
- For this school, the 'early application' deadline is 6th
 October and the 'standard application' deadline is
 28th November 2025.
- Each universities can't see your other choices on UCAS when you apply.



The personal statement

- The only section students have full control over
- Students only chance to market themselves individually

The same for all choices

- A maximum of 4,000 characters, or 47 lines
- A minimum of 1,000 characters
 - There isn't a spelling or grammar check
- 📐 No formatting is allowed

UCAS' similarity detection service: every personal statement is run through software to check for plagiarism

Three questions for 2025 to 2026

The three new personal statement question prompts were chosen by UCAS following extensive research, testing and validation with students, teachers and advisers, and universities and colleges:

Why do you want to study this course or subject?

This is an applicant's opportunity to showcase their passion for and knowledge of their chosen subject, to demonstrate to universities and colleges why they are a good fit, and to outline any future ambitions.

- How have your qualifications and studies helped you to prepare for this course or subject? In this section applicants can describe relevant or transferable skills they've gained in education, and demonstrate their understanding of how these will help them succeed in their chosen course or subject area.
- What else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences helpful? Here applicants can reflect on their personal experiences, and any other activities they have undertaken outside their education to further demonstrate their suitability for the course.

Universities and colleges will review the:



personal statement

They may also ask for:

Replies to offers

Once decisions have been made by the universities on all choices, students can choose two:

- one as a 'firm' acceptance their first choice
- the other as an 'insurance' acceptance. This acts as a back-up if you do not get into your 'firm' choice

Any remaining offers the student holds are automatically declined.



What can students be doing now?

- research, research, research
- attend open days and events both online and inperson
- extra-curricular and super-curricular activities, including subject tasters and summer schools
- work experience, volunteering
- independent learning outside the curriculum
- adding drafts of their personal statement on Unifrog
- focus on this year's studies!

Admissions tests

Most university courses do not require additional Admissions Tests.

Please check each university website carefully where they are required for particular courses, for deadlines and details of how to apply to undertake the tests.

Student finance

All eligible students resident in England apply for finance through <u>Student Finance England</u>, wherever they intend to go to university in the UK.

All eligible students can receive an undergraduate tuition fee loan for each year of their course. How much maintenance loan they will get depends on where they'll study and your household income. You can estimate this using the <u>student finance calculator</u>.

Year 13 students apply for finance between March and May.

Students simply <u>create an account</u> on gov.uk. Depending on your household circumstances, as parents and carers, you may subsequently receive a link from Student Finance England to create an account yourself and submit your personal details including your household income.
