

2022-23 Daily Trips and Residential Experiences Report to Governors

The School employs a dedicated member of staff (Educational Visits Administrator - Claire McGrory) who is employed to oversee the procurement of trips and residential visits. This is because we value greatly the positive impact of this provision which provides enormous cultural value and enriching experiences. Claire is supported by the Finance Team who process payments. The whole process is overseen by Helen Birch (Deputy Headteacher - Pastoral) who acts as the school's Education Visitors Coordinator (EVC). Claire, Helen and Lynne (Learning for Life Head of Department)

met on a fortnightly to plan the Activities Week programme for the forthcoming year after reviewing the previous years' provision in order that we could enhance the offer to pupils and book early to secure venues and travel to the various activities.

as part of their NEA preparation (coursework component).








directors, designers and actors.

In the middle of November JD1 enjoyed a seeing a variety of aircraft and military vehicles on their trip to Duxford. They also had the opportunity to handle historical artefacts. The visit really helped to bring their school work on World War II to life.

In late November the Geography Department took Year 12 students to listen to micro-lectures from senior pupils from the Norwich Schools Partnership. The lectures showcased a broad range of subjects in human, physical and

environmental geography and we plan to emulate this opportunity at King's soon.



Also in late November, Year 9 and Year 11 classicists visited the Museum of London and the London Mithraeum. It gave Year 9 a good introduction to the topic of Roman Britain which they studied the rest of the year. For Year 11 it was a good way for them to consolidate their knowledge ahead of their GCSE Roman Civilisation paper. The London Mithraeum was particularly spectacular as it was enhanced by a light and sound show.

In December the Christmas Market trip to Aachen returned post COVID and was a great success for all involved. Forty-two Year 8 and 9 German students took to the bus, braved the French border control and happily arrived in Aachen on 1 December. They started off with a continental breakfast in a local café in Aachen

centre, which set everyone up for a festive winter's day at the Christmas Market. After sampling German *Lebkuchen* and *Kinderpunsch* the group visited Aachen Cathedral to admire Charlemagne's shrine and treasure. This year they stayed in Aachen for a night and took another shopping tour around the market



and a quick optional stop at the Lindt chocolate factory. Next morning, they set off back to Calais with a stop in Belgium for a chocolate workshop to break up the journey. There was no lack of chocolate or Christmas

attended the Academy Conferences A-Level Religious Studies Conference in Cambridge, hearing some esteemed lecturers, Theologians and Philosophers such as Daphne Hampson, who gave a particularly thought-provoking talk on Feminist Theology. There was also a debate at the end of the day, which some students contributed to and definitely got people talking! The conference was a great experience for students to see what further study at an institution such as The University of Cambridge might look like, but also to hear well-known scholars speaking on topics that are on the A-Level specification.

In early January the English Department ran a trip to see An Inspector Calls at The Theatre Royal in Nottingham. It was absolutely stunning location, and a brilliant showing of Stephen Daldry's multi award-winning National Theatre production of JB Priestley's classic thriller. The Year 10 and 11 students particularly enjoyed the subtle working-class folk in the wings portraying the Birling family's effects on them, and the gradual changes to costume and set that were almost imperceptible - a wonderful interpretation of the Priestley's messages for a modern audience that was sure to have enhanced our GCSE Literature students' understanding of the play.

Also, in January, the Year 13 Economics students entered the IEA Budget Challenge.

They used this to revise their Year 12 macro topics. They prepared a budget for 2023 considering: an outline analysis of the macroeconomic conditions and likely outlook for the next two years; an outline of the main economic goals to be pursued and the broad strategy used to realise them and a proposed budget, setting out taxes and other sources of revenue, expected levels of spending by department, and details of expected borrowing (if any). The students worked in teams of three or four and we submitted nine entries to the IEA. We were very excited that two teams were invited to the semi-finals in Westminster. The teams presented very well and one of the teams was invited back to the final. They gave an accomplished performance and developed confidence and public speaking skills in addition to really strengthening their macro-economic knowledge.

In February all GCSE and A-Level Drama students travelled to the Curve Theatre in Leicester to see the National Theatre's adaptation of the novel, *Ocean at the End of the Lane*. This was an excellent opportunity for students to see a contemporary, avant-garde piece of theatre. The production wowed all of us through its theatre magic and heightened, stylised movements; many of our GCSE students then looked at how to embed these within their examination performances.

Thirty-seven art students from Years 11 and 12 were on a residential trip to Amsterdam in February. As part of the visit they visited the Kroller Muller Museum in Otterlo which houses one of the most important collections of Modern Art in the World. The museum is set in a nature reserve which housed a sculpture park and in which we they cycled. In Amsterdam they visited the famous Van Gogh museum, Rijksmuseum, FOAM photography gallery and Stedelijk Modern Art Museum. Students took a Canal trip which provided a great

During the February half term break, sixty-eight pupils and eight staff enjoyed a fantastic six days of skiing in the Austrian Alps. Based in Götzens, on the outskirts of Innsbruck the group were able to visit four different ski resorts during the week, including the amazing Stubai Glacier. After a few frustrating days learning the basics, the beginners were soon up and running and starting to explore the remarkable landscapes, as well as enjoying the odd hot chocolate or two!

The more experienced skiers in the group, covered well over 150 km of slopes during the week and even manager

week and even managed to find time for some ski ballet! Après ski activities kept the group busy with swimming, bowling, curling and a quiz - we won't mention that staff were the bowling and quiz winners! After a week of fantastic blue skies, amazing snow and experiences that will last a lifetime, the group were all presented with awards and thanks were given to our hosts and the ski instructors, before a



long journey home. A massive thank you to all the staff and pupil for making it an unbelievable trip - Mr Pinguenet (the trip leader) commented that it was a pleasure to be with the group and that the students were a credit to the school.



In March, the Year 12 Fine Art students visited Oundle school's Yarrow Gallery, curating their work. They also attended a group critique and talk from the school's artist-in-residence for the term, Susan Atwill. This week long exhibition displayed their personal investigations as works in progress and offered the students critique, suggestions and inspiration to help elevate their artistic explorations.

On 10 March 2023, JD1 were planning to visit Rutland Water for a hike. Due to some unexpected, heavy snow the trip had to be cancelled. Instead, JD pupils visited Central Park where they enjoyed playing in the snow with their class mates and teachers.

March also saw our A-Level Theatre Studies students take the short walk to the New Theatre in Peterborough to see *Heathers* - The Musical. This touring production was a solid example of slick, professional theatre with a stylised, teenaged plot line. Students thoroughly enjoyed the show and this only reaffirmed their passion and enjoyment of this subject.

Again, in March, in collaboration with the Science Department, Drama took one hundred Year 9s to see the critically acclaimed musical adaptation of the film, Back to the Future. The show summed up everything that modern musical theatre is all about; magic, revolutionary grounds in theatrical technology and a DeLorean trick that, to this day, we still can't work out how it was done. A fantastic experience for all staff and students in attendance.

Towards the end of March King's entered five students in the Year 8 Oundle Balloon Debate competition. The competition involves public speaking with the aim of staying in an imaginary balloon. The students had to deliver two speeches: one as a sporting star and one as a pop star. Once again one of students reached the final but did not make the final balloon cut.



The final event in March was the Business and Economics Department residential to Brussels; over the course of the three-day residential students visited Stella Artois Factory, Central Bank of Belgium, the European Parliament and the European Commission with an aim of developing their Economic knowledge as well as their appreciation of large-scale manufacturing.

The Classics trip to Italy in March was a two-centre trip the group stayed in Rome for three nights and the Bay of Naples for three nights - which enabled them to see a wide range of famous Roman sites from the Colosseum to Pompeii, from Vesuvius to the Roman forum. They were also able to see other sites including St Peter's basilica and Santa Maria Maggiore, only narrowly missing the Pope as he visited the church! Whilst it was snowing and cold when they got to the top of Vesuvius, it made the crater more dramatic as they could see the steam rising as the snow landed on the hot rocks. Our 6th formers were able to use their knowledge from their studies to act as guides at points to the younger pupils. It was a very successful trip with most pupils saying they would recommend this trip to others and we had many conversations in the weeks after with students about the places they had visited.

In May Year12 Biologists had a rather soggy start to their day at Ferry Meadows but luckily things soon brightened up. The students spent the day learning about measuring biodiversity and did several surveys of the area of both

plants and animals. The students completed the activities needed

On 14 March, after much extra-curricular practice within the school day, six Year 9 Latin students took part in a Reading Competition at the Leys School in Cambridge. They performed dramatic solo readings of a story in Latin, as well as taking part a larger dramatic group performance. One student also learned the pronunciation and vocabulary for an Ancient Greek passage and performed an individual reading on the day. While no prizes were awarded, all students were commended on their excellent fluency and pronunciation of the ancient language.

On Tuesday 13 June JD2 went to Ferry Meadows to canoe, Kayak and sail. They received safety awareness training

from the instructors before they began. The groups too it in turns to experience all the activities. They then sat on the shade to enjoy a well-earned lunch.

live jousting event depicting the War of the Roses; with them very vocally getting involved on the side of the House of Lancaster! Pupils





The visit complimented their previous learning on the power of Medieval Kings and the rise of the House of Tudor.

The second day was run by the English Department - the Year 7 'Shakespearience' experience aimed to bring Elizabethan theatre to life. The providers, Quantum Theatre, used the historical backdrop of the Cathedral's Cloisters to work with students to look at the Shakespearean comedy 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. During the day, students took part in a number of fun interactive activities; and were introduced to the play's key themes, characters, plot and aspects of stagecraft. The day climaxed in a live performance of the play.

During Activities Week Year 8 enjoyed a rich array of experiences. On the Monday they visited the Yorkshire Sculpture Park and started the day with in a gallery exploring upside down caravans and distorted life size vehicles. They then enjoyed some photography around the sculpture gardens where students took selfies besides human sized gherkins and giant dancing pink suits. We then went for a 3 kilometre walk through the Antony Gormley sculpture trail. At one spot we could see right out across the Yorkshire countryside; a truly spectacular view and an exhausting but exciting and memorable day.

On the Thursday Year 8 students visited the Warner Bros. Studio Tour in London where they were offered the opportunity to experience the authentic sets, props, costumes, animatronics and special effects used in the eight Harry Potter films. On the next day they visited the National Space Centre and discovered six galleries, including the iconic Rocket Tower and the UK's largest domed planetarium, crammed full of space suits, rockets, satellites and meteorites. On the final day of the Year 8 Activities Week Young Enterprise. The 'Learn to Earn' programme is a practical, activity-based programme designed to provide students with an economic awareness of the link between what they do at School and their future life prospects. The students worked in small groups and were tasked to design and set up a themed café. They also enjoyed a team building exercise

involving spaghetti and marsh mallows-who could build the biggest tower!

In the heart of the Lincolnshire countryside, just north of Grantham, lies the beautiful grounds of Caythorpe Court. This was the home for Year 9 during their outdoor and adventure residential. The students were accommodated in rigid frame tents which stood on hard, 'all weather' bases, de lux camping! Students were placed into groups of twelve, each with their own instructor and School member of staff. There were four activities each day, two in the morning and two in the afternoon lasting around and an hour and a half. Activities included raft building, giant swing, archery, high ropes, zip wire, axe throwing, Jacob's ladder, frisbee golf and trapeze. The groups also enjoyed an evening activity such as a whole group campfire and archery tag.

The Year 9 students that chose not to go on residential experienced an enrichment week that involved a Cathedral Tower, the Peterborough Blue Plaque Walk, various problem-solving activities, a walk to Ferry Meadows and an orienteering course whilst there and a cultural quiz. On the final

afternoon students delivered their presentations on the History of Peterborough for which prizes were awarded.

For the first two days of Activities week Year 10 were split into two groups. On Monday one group enjoyed a trip to Thorpe Park for the day, sampling the many rides available. Back at school meanwhile, the other group experienced a carousel of workshops which enhanced and consolidated their Learning for Life knowledge and skills. The workshops were as follows: The Breck Foundation - delivered education about online safety, a true story of grooming and influencing a young person via gaming, The Terrence Higgins Trust - delivered important messages about consent, relationships and sexual health, First Aid - Qualified First Aid educators were asked to come and instruct the students how to use a Defibrillator and perform basic first aid. On Tuesday the groups switched and enjoyed the different activities from the previous day. The rest of the week the year group went out on Work Experience enjoying a wide range of careers in the wider world.

The Pupil Premium Department identified Pupil Premium students and families who maybe financially challenged by the cost of extracurricular activities and school trips. More and more of our families are suffering financial hardship due to the cost of living crisis and are unable to fund these cultural capital events. As a school we strongly feel every child should have an equal opportunity to participate in all activities offered. Pupil Premium uptake last year was as follows:

- 100% of our Pupil Premium students participated in one or more of school trips
- 73% attended various after school or lunch time clubs
- 47% represented the school in a sports team

One example of this was the Pupil Premium sailing trip; most of those had never experienced a water-based activity before. Towards the end of the academic year Pupil Premium students enjoyed a trip to Dessert Lounge to reward them for their attendance and engagement within mentoring sessions at lunchtimes and registration within the Department.
